By no means however was this a record setting month in any regard, but thanks to another month of almost double the monthly average, we took a huge yearly deficit and in two months changed it to a surplus. As we look ahead to November, we anticipate the cooling of temperatures and a decline in the amount of precipitation. We also look for the change in precipitation to our first measurable snow of the year, which also will usher in the beginning of the holiday season.
